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Introduction

As a first time mom with two children under the age of two, I was in search of learning activities for my children online. I would often look at Pinterest or Google and find all sorts of activities for crafts, messy play, and free printables. But there did not seem to be any structure to the activities.

I wanted to know the “Why?”

Why were some activities being included in a preschool learning curriculum while others were not?

What sorts of activities were preschoolers *in paid preschool programs* experiencing and *how could I recreate that experience at home?*

Research Based Preschool Learning

I did some research. A woman and physician named **Maria Montessori** devoted her life's work to studying childhood development.

She observed thousands of children over the course of many decades and found that from the ages of 18 months through age six, children are sensitive to learning certain skills at certain ages — when learning is most naturally absorbed and internalized.

There are **windows for learning**. It doesn't mean a child can't learn at an older age, but there are ideal ages when it is best to introduce age appropriate materials and activities when the child has the greatest propensity to learn.

Preschool at Home

With this new information, I now knew how to select age appropriate activities and create a balanced curriculum. By introducing activities to my preschooler during the age appropriate windows of learning, I was able to help him develop skills like tracing a line, identifying shapes, and solving puzzles. As he became better at certain skills, I could introduce new activities, and help him progress in his learning.

What Visual Montessori™ is NOT

Visual Montessori™ is NOT screen time entertainment. I believe educational programming has its place, but Visual Montessori™ is a hands-on teaching and learning experience for both the caretaker and the child. The program capitalizes on learning through guided play and exposure to planned activities.

As a preschooler grows and matures, there are some activities they can complete independently. But in the beginning, many of the activities will require the teacher to work with the child to show the child where to start.

The POWER behind Visual Montessori™

Visual Montessori™ is a visual learning and teaching method based upon the 12 sensitive periods as outlined in Montessori. Why is it called visual? A major feature of this method is the arrangement of course materials in drawers. By planning out weekly preschool activities and loading them into drawers, a mom or caretaker can quickly see if all 12 sensitive periods are planned for during that week. This helps the “teacher” (mom or caretaker) plan a learning curriculum with balance, a purpose and a plan.

Why Montessori?

A Montessori preschool teacher thoughtfully prepares a classroom environment with materials and activities that entice her students to learn. She may guide her students to new lessons and challenges, but it is the child’s interaction with what the environment has to offer that enables learning to occur.

All You Need: Printables, Household Objects, Items from your Kitchen, and Toys

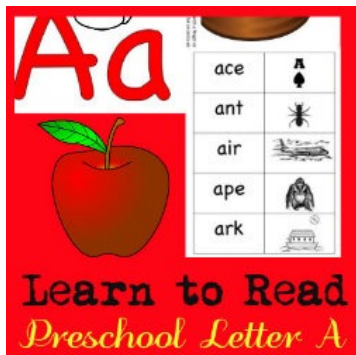

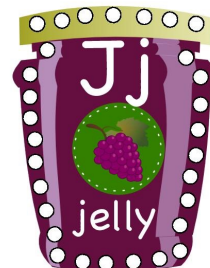
“Jump Rope Rhymes”

Jelly Lace-up

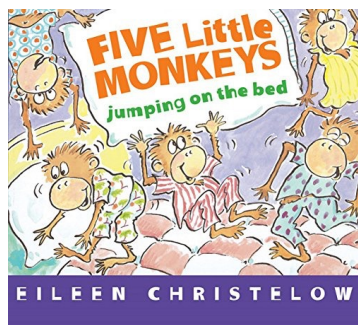

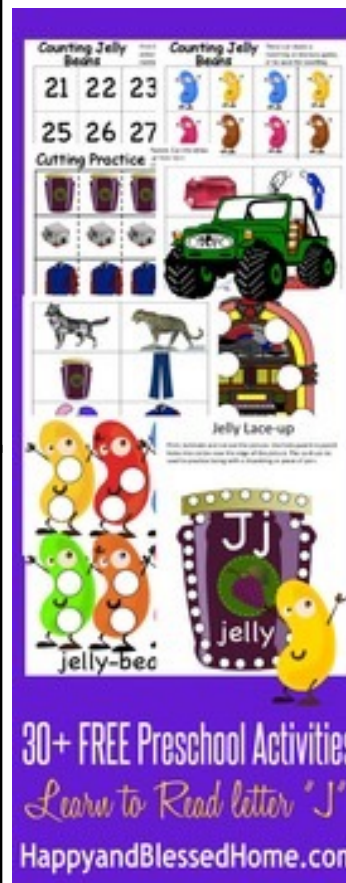
